Transferring Credit

Previous college coursework must be at the college level (1000-level or higher) and a grade of C- or better must be earned. Pass grades are accepted. There is not a maximum number of credits that will transfer to St. Catherine; however, residency requirements will apply.

Applying to Associate Degree Programs

Applications to associate degree programs at St. Catherine operate on a rolling admission basis, which means that applications are processed as they are received. A minimum 2.0 GPA is required. Students must submit an application, application fee, and official transcripts from each high school and university. ACT, SAT, or PSAT scores are not required for admission to associate degree programs. Please note that some programs have other admission deadlines that need to be met; please contact St. Catherine for further information.

Transfer Scholarships for Associate Degree Students

Scholarship for students who know a St. Catherine graduate, \$300. Referral card required with application.
DupliKate Scholarship, \$2000. Daughter or granddaughter of alum, annually renewable.
Family Scholarship, \$1000 per family member. Sister, mother, etc., renewable while attending simultaneously.

Health Information Specialist Coursework

Health information specialists collect, organize, analyze and disseminate health information in numerous health-related settings. The health information specialist ensures the quality of medical records by verifying their completeness, accuracy and proper entry into computer systems. They use computer applications to assemble and analyze health information as well as in coding diagnoses and procedures from patient records for reimbursement and research. You will use computerized systems to become competent in five areas: information manager, coding specialist, quality assurance specialist, supervisory manager and cancer registry specialist.

You can earn your associate of applied science degree in the health information specialist program in a way that best fits your needs. Full time students take two years to complete their studies. Clinical experience begins the first term, and students take liberal arts and science and health information specialist courses concurrently. Part time students can use the Extended/Preprofessional Program option and take about three years to complete their studies. Students start by taking liberal arts and science courses before beginning health information specialist courses.

Associate Nursing Coursework

The associate degree program, located on the College's Minneapolis campus, is offered in four semesters. Students enter the day section in the fall semester and the evening/weekend section in winter semester. A mobility section (licensed practical nurse only) curriculum is offered in the evening/ weekend format and begins in winter semester, continues through the summer and is completed the following fall semester. While the curricular outcomes are the same for all three sections, the mobility curriculum is built on competencies attained through licensed practical nursing education. Evaluation of curricular outcomes is assessed through several quantitative and qualitative measures.

About the College of St. Catherine's Associate Degree Programs

The College of St. Catherine is a national leader in providing high quality associate degree programs and certificates in health care. Areas of associate degree study on the College's Minneapolis campus include: Nursing, Occupational Therapy Assistant, Physical Therapist Assistant, Radiographer, Sonographer, Ophthalmic Technician, Health Information Specialist, Phlebotomist, Coding Specialist and more. Ophthalmic Technician Coursework

In the Ophthalmic Technician Program, you will learn through classroom lectures and discussion, laboratory demonstrations and practice, and clinical experiences in eye clinic settings in the Twin Cities area. The curriculum includes 30 semester credits of liberal arts and sciences courses and 40 semester credits of ophthalmic courses. Approximately 1,000 hours of supervised clinical experience is built into the curriculum and students will rotate through various eye clinics in the Twin Cities.

Upon graduating at the end of the two-year program, you will be eligible to take the Certified Ophthalmic Technician (COT) certification examination administered by JCAHPO (Joint Commission on Allied Health Personnel in Ophthalmology). The COT certification is the intermediate level of expertise and represents an excellent balance of knowledge and skills. In its career ladder JCAHPO has also established a certification pathway for COTs, who have been in the profession for three years, to take the examination for the advanced level of certification (COMT).

Physical Therapy Assistant Coursework

Radiography Coursework

As a radiographer, you will work in a variety of settings, including hospitals, clinics and outpatient centers. You will acquire critical-thinking skills and an excellent understanding of human anatomy, interact with a variety of patients, gain experience in cutting-edge radiologic technology, and develop skills in safe radiologic procedures, body positions and patient care. You may specialize in many different areas immediately after graduation, such as computerized tomography, magnetic resonance imaging and vascular procedures. You could also continue your education in fields such as ultrasound, nuclear medicine and radiation therapy.
